

Award-Winning Employability Training at FareShare Yorkshire

The Yorkshire charity that tackles food waste and hunger by collecting and redistributing surplus supermarket food is also making a difference to the life chances of refugees. In addition to redistributing food to over 400 charities, schools and community groups, FareShare Yorkshire also offers training and employability programmes in their Barnsley and Leeds warehouses.

The training, which is open to anyone in need of support to get into work, covers Manual Handling, Health & Safety and Food Hygiene, as well as general Employability skills. The two-day-aweek course extends over 13 weeks and is free of charge. Attendees also receive travel expenses, free lunches and necessary clothing. To gain a certificate, they must complete all 26 sessions.

Mo Aryana went on the course and was employed by FareShare as a fork lift truck driver in their Leeds warehouse. He has since been promoted to Warehouse Supervisor. You can read Mo's story on the national Refugee Council website here <u>http://bit.ly/45ftJgH</u>

Andy Atkinson, who leads the Refugee Men's Support Group in Barnsley, spent a long time finding suitable training and work experience for those in the group. Now he works with the Refugee Council in Barnsley to introduce both male and female refugees to FareShare. Andy said,

Barnsley Refugee Bike Project Reaches New Milestone!

Barnsley's Refugee Bike Project recently celebrated a major anniversary – a year since receiving the keys to their new town centre home which has transformed the project from backyard venture to significant service provider, all staffed by volunteers.

The project's new home in Wellington House, supported by the National Lottery Fund, enabled the addition of workshop facilities. Now those who receive the bikes can help to recycle them, learning new skills from expert volunteers. The workshop has not only helped to provide affordable transport for refugees and asylum seekers but has also offered a place to improve language skills and make friends.



Volunteer Co-ordinator Alex Simon, who founded the project, explains that it's been a team effort: "Thanks to the efforts of those who helped with the planning, securing bids, donating bikes, delivering cakes, renovating bikes, building websites and supporting the team, we have managed to donate almost 200 bikes since June 2024."

Overall, since starting, the project has donated over 500 bikes to those in need and has gained a national reputation, with features on the BBC website http://bit.ly/4kbmcDj BBC Look North and BBC Radio Sheffield. CEO of the national Refugee Council, Enver Solomon, officially opened the workshop last autumn with Olympian Ed Clancy OBE, South Yorkshire Active Travel Commissioner. The project had a stand in the Tour of Yorkshire finishing zone and was featured in the video review of the stage.

Not only does the project donate pre-loved and recycled bikes, Alex and the team also organise monthly bike rides, which have become central to the project, supporting mental and physical health. The rides have enabled those new to Barnsley to explore the scenic routes across the Borough, helping to familiarise them with their new surroundings as well as providing opportunity for making connections. More trips are planned, including longer distance ones.

> Alex Simon sums up: "One of the successes of the project has been meeting so many talented, committed and selfless individuals who have given their time and energy to build our community. Most importantly, through the workshop and the bike rides, we have supported those who needed a helping hand, a mode of transport and a place to meet new friends."

Reporting Hate Crime

My name is Rachael, and I am the Hate Crime Coordinator for Barnsley within South Yorkshire Police. I am fairly new to this role, just starting at the end of February 2025. Prior to this, I have been travelling to Europe, Australia, and South East Asia, as well as completing my Masters Degree and Undergraduate Degree.

Part of my role as Hate Crime Coordinator involves increasing awareness about hate crime, specifically what it means, what constitutes a hate crime, and how to report it.

The official definition of hate crime is "Any criminal offence which is perceived by the victim or any other person, to be motivated by hostility or prejudice based on a person's race, religion, sexual orientation, disability, or gender identity." So, in other words, a hate crime is any criminal act or behaviour which the victim, or anyone else,

believes to be motivated by hostility or malice towards someone because of a personal characteristic.

If you, or someone you know, has been victim of a criminal offence and believe you were targeted because of your race, religion, sexual orientation, gender identity and/or disability then this can and should be reported. You can report hate crimes to the police by visiting <u>https://www.southyorkshire.police.uk/</u> going to 'Report' and selecting 'Hate crime', then following the steps to complete the form. If you do not want to report directly to the police, visit <u>https://www.stophateuk.org/</u> select 'Report' then follow the steps given. 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

Barnsley Celebrates Refugee Week 2025

Refugee Week is the world's largest arts and culture festival celebrating the contributions, creativity, and resilience of people seeking sanctuary. Founded in the UK in 1998, it takes place every June alongside World Refugee Day. This year it spanned 16 to 22 June.

Barnsley was buzzing with activities for Refugee Week, ranging from theatre and film to craft activities, musical performances and awards ceremonies. Events were supported and promoted by the Barnsley Borough City of Sanctuary Group. Chair George Arthur said, "We are really proud that we can organise these events to bring communities together."

Monday. It all kicked off with a busy open morning at the Education Learning Support Hub (ELSH), home to free, accessible education for those seeking sanctuary. In the afternoon, 'Fremont' was showing free-of-charge at Library @ the Lightbox – a film by Iranian-American director Babak Jalali about a young woman working in a fortune cookie factory in California after fleeing from Afghanistan.

Tuesday. Hope House Church hosted a powerful performance of 'How To Be Lucky', a play exploring the contemporary reality of being a refugee in Britain today. Later that evening, Brazilian-born professional journalist Livia Barreira compered an open mic session for 35 people at the Library @ the Lightbox, giving a voice to those with a passion for poetry, spoken word and music.

Fellow Brazilian musician, Ruth Mariana, was one of the many people who sang, read poetry or presented at this event.

Wednesday. Winners of the 2025 City of Sanctuary School Art and Poetry Competition were announced at a presentation in the Council Chamber attended by over 40 people.

Awards were presented by the Mayor of Barnsley, Cllr David Leach, who said: "I am thrilled to have been invited here for Refugee Week for this special time to celebrate resilience, hope and coming together as a community. Today is about reminding ourselves of what makes Barnsley so special – kindness, inclusivity and unity."

A craft and poetry workshop celebrating this diversity and welcome followed in the afternoon.

Barnsley Celebrated as a Place of Sanctuary

Barnsley has won two national awards recognising outstanding work by the Borough's Libraries and Museums to create a culture of welcome.

The awards have been made by national charity City of Sanctuary, which supports organisations across the UK to offer welcome to those seeking sanctuary from war and persecution. City of Sanctuary awards are based on three key principles – learn, embed and share. Organisations have to demonstrate that they:

- Help their staff to Learn about what it means to seek sanctuary
- Embed welcome, safety and inclusion in the way the organisation works and what it offers
- Share these ideas and initiatives with the wider community to help raise awareness and create a network of welcome.

In Barnsley, the award-winning Library Service offers a Conversation Café which meets every Monday in Library @ The Lightbox, supported by volunteers. Here people can come to practise their English. The libraries also offer books and newspapers in other languages, free access to computers, public WIFI and printing, as well as events and activities aimed at those seeking sanctuary. In addition, library staff work hard to ensure that those new to Barnsley know about all events, activities and services on offer.

Kathryn Green, Head of Libraries, said, "We're delighted to be presented with the Library of Sanctuary Award. The Library Service always looks to be a welcoming space for everyone in our community to come together to socialise and learn new skills and enjoy the wide variety of services and activities that we have to offer. We've worked very hard over the

last few years to articulate that offer to people in Barnsley and to introduce new offers as well, such as last night's Multilingual Open Mic which was a huge success. We are seeking to increase our accessibility and inclusivity for everybody. This has been due to the hard work of our library staff who welcome people every day.

Community Heritage Curator, Steven Skelley, tells us about the award: "This award means the world to us, we're over the moon, because it's recognition of the work we're doing. It helps us to believe in what we're doing and it gives us credibility when we go to funders.

"The mainstay of our offer for refugees and asylum seekers is our 'Feels Like Home' group. In 2018 Feels Like Home was a footnote in our activity plan, with a £2,000 budget for the whole year, no members and no prior experience of working with any refugees or asylum seekers. Since then, it has blossomed into a flagship community group with over 200 members of many nationalities, which contributes to the welcoming atmosphere of our museum sites and throughout the whole of Barnsley.

"The group meets every week and that is the bedrock of what we do. I think a lot of places do projects and then they move on until the next funding comes, but we make sure we are always there. We learn about each other's cultures and we also do cultural projects, some of them major. Back in 2021, we hosted Little Amal, the giant puppet of a 10-year-old Syrian refugee child who has become a global symbol of compassion and human rights. From performing at Destination Barnsley and Bright Nights, to establishing the Blossom Choir, Feels Like Home has become an integral part of Barnsley's cultural scene. Alongside that, we offer practical support. The group has become like a family, and we help with all of life's issues, not just cultural activities."

A Place to Welcome Through the Ages

Steven Skelley is Community Heritage Curator at Barnsley Museums. His role is to collect and showcase evidence of the people and the stories that make Barnsley what it is today. Steven reminds us that people have come to Barnsley from all over the world for many centuries past – passing through, but often staying for work and making Barnsley their home.

"Coins minted in Cleopatra's name have been found in the fields of Barnsley. Emperor Hadrian came here when the Romans ruled Britain. When the Vikings came, they left us words that we still use today. So much so, that when we have Danish visitors, they sometimes recognise these words and comment. For example, we say 'laking out' to mean 'playing out'. There are many examples. Embedded within our museums are lots of stories of people coming and going, some sad, some happy – the result of war, migration and the search for work."

Steven knows this from his own experience: "My surname is from the West Coast of Ireland and I know my family came here to work in the mines when food was scarce in Ireland. We recently organised a blue plaque to commemorate the Hungarian mine workers who came here in the 19th Century. Earlier, in the 16th and 17th centuries, Barnsley saw the arrival of Huguenots escaping religious persecution in France. They helped to set up the Barnsley linen trade which was the finest linen you could buy in the country. The list goes on. We had a Polish resettlement site at Cannon Hall, which is part of the museum service. During the second World War, loads of people were sent here escaping Nazi persecution and when the war ended a lot of them stayed. We try to capture all these stories in our museums and show that, without all these waves of people, there would not be a Barnsley as we know it."



Standing Room Only for Ukrainian Play

A classic Ukrainian play performed by the Ukrainian British Friendship Group from Huddersfield was a popular highlight of Penistone Arts Week this year. The capacity crowd at St Andrew's Church, Penistone, was treated to singing, dancing and drama telling the story of 'Chasing Two Hares', about a man who chases two women but comes unstuck. The poignant moral of the tale is 'Truth always wins'.

Production Director, Natalia Mirkun, interviewed by Penistone FM, said: "It's amazing when people are laughing at our jokes and connecting with our story. It's what art is all about – connecting with our souls – and today, I think, we've connected with a lot of souls."

The idea of holding an event in Penistone Arts Week came from local resident Iryna Vasyliv, a member of the Ukrainian British Friendship Group. Iryna and her children, now aged 13 and 9, came to the UK under the Homes for Ukraine scheme in 2022. Iryna said: "I was very proud that the event was taking place in Penistone where I live. I feel it is my duty to help my community to understand about Ukraine. In the current world order, we need to get to know each other better and be closer to other people."

Introducing the performance, Iryna invited the audience to complete an imaginative journey around Ukraine, with the final stop at the Chasing two Hares monument next to St Andrew's church in Kyiv, a symbolic link with Penistone.

Together with Ukrainian ladies from Barnsley and Huddersfield, Iryna organised food at the event, which was a major feature alongside the play. Dishes included:

Borscht – a UNESCO heritage dish

Buckwheat potato pie and cabbage rolls with choice of gravies – also heritage dishes Cutlets and dumplings Curd cheese balls, curd cheese buns and curd cheesecake Dressed herring salad and garlicky pickled carrot Poppy seed roll and potato pancakes Rye bread and traditional fizzy malt drink Kvas – served as a welcome gift Waffles with condensed milk – a favourite with the children



Iryna was delighted with the turnout and the response to the meal: "I thought the food was a great way of engaging people. Ukrainian ladies love cooking. Where many Ukrainian ladies are gathering, always expect lots of food."

But first, we want to show the play at a main theatre in Huddersfield because even though it was created there, it has never been shown there.Together, we can win."

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Social Prescribing is about helping people improve their health and well-being by connecting them to nonmedical support in the community. In Barnsley, our service supports individuals with a wide range of needs from mental health and social isolation to accessing practical help with housing, debt, education, or finding community activities. one approach and work closely with local partners to make sure people get the right support.


